A+	PULSE	Depression and Altered Behavior	464-0609	30 minute video plus course materials	Behavioral emergencies often lack many of the clinical, objective signs and symptoms associated with other medical emergencies. This makes these emergencies extremely challenging and, oftentimes, dangerous for everyone involved. This course identifies depression and altered behavior and describes the appropriate size-up, assessment, and treatment for these patients. Proper patient takedown and restraint procedures are also discussed.
A+	American Heat	Vehicle Fires: New Technology and Response	463-0609	30 minute video plus course materials	This course presents up-to-the-minute safety tips on suppressing vehicle fires, including proper tactics, wearing PPE, and scene safety. The course showcases some examples of new types of vehicle fires, such as compressed natural gas (CNG) vehicles, electric vehicles, and gasoline-powered vehicles, with an eye on firefighter safety in suppression, salvage, and overhaul. The course describes a Seattle CNG vehicle fire and explosion and the danger it posed to responding crews.
A+	Firefighter Training	Safe Parking: Street Survival	038-0609	30 minute video plus course materials	The previous safe parking course, Safe Parking: Tools and Equipment, examined the tools and equipment you need to be safe at the scene of a highway incident. This course demonstrates how to effectively use this equipment to avoid becoming a "struck-by" statistic.
A+	Firefighter Training	Safe Parking: Tools and Equipment	038-0608	30 minute video plus course materials	This course is an operations-level responder training and safety program for personnel who work in or near moving traffic at vehicle-related incidents, traffic stops, disabled vehicle tow and recovery, vehicle collisions, vehicle fires, etc. Specific tactics for safely establishing command and establishing temporary traffic control zones on the roadway are discussed. Interagency cooperation and understanding of responder roles and responsibilities are emphasized.
A+	Firefighter Training	Class A Foam and Compressed Air Foam	038-1106	30 minute video plus course materials	Learning how and why certain equipment and products work is very important. Without the proper training, you never truly learn how to use equipment and products to their full potential, nor do you learn what actions may make things worse or less effective. Gaining information allows you to make informative decisions on whether you think the benefits are worth the cost for your department. This holds true for Class A foam and CAFS. The information in this course will provide the pros and cons of each of these products and allow you to use them more effectively.
A+	Firefighter Training	Radiological Monitoring, Part 3	737-0124	30 minute video plus course materials	This course describes the major types of packaging used by the department of energy to transport radioactive materials and the corresponding relative hazards for emergency response personnel. The course concludes with a re-enactment of a transportation incident involving radioactive materials.
A+	Firefighter Training	Confined Space Rescue, Part 1: Defining the Hazards	750-0001	30 minute video plus course materials	This is the first part of our rescue technician series. This introductory course will help firefighters and fire officers develop a respect for the dangers of a confined space emergency. A review of the laws, rules, regulations, and standards that apply to confined space rescue provides a foundation for response to these emergencies.
A+	Firefighter Training	Confined Space Rescue, Part 2: Safety Practices, Personnel, and PPE	750-0002	30 minute video plus course materials	Confined spaces have the potential to contain or develop numerous hazards. Such potential hazards can dramatically impact the safety of rescuers and consequently the outcome of any such incident. This course presents safety guidelines and considerations that are unique to confined space. Personal protective equipment (PPE) is discussed as it relates to those safety considerations. Common terminology will be defined, and the role of required personnel such as the entry supervisor, attendant, and entrant will be discussed.

A+	Firefighter Training	Fire Marshal's Office: Fire Prevention and Life Safety Programs	038-0408	30 minute video plus course materials	This course is designed to teach fire suppression personnel what constitutes a comprehensive fire and life safety prevention program. It will include material that explains why that is important for public safety and why it is important to firefighters. Concurrently, it will offer some perspective to other fire prevention personnel who are in a position where they are trying to design and defend their own programs.
A+	American Heat	Chain Reaction Collisions	463-1203	60 minute video plus course materials	Many fire departments consider traffic accidents routine incidents. But what if you arrived at a reported 20-vehicle scene to discover 200 vehicles, with car fires, people trapped, walking wounded, and hazardous material spills? Where would you begin? That is exactly what the departments in this course encountered on responses to two of the nation's largest chain reaction collisions. When Stafford, Virginia, volunteer firefighters arrived on the scene of a traffic accident, they discovered two things: a 117 vehicle pile-up and a need for a multiagency mass casualty action plan. In Long Beach, California, a chain reaction collision involving 198 vehicles left a freeway paralyzed and a department controlling chaos. Both stories illustrate why implementing a mass casualty incident management system and multiagency response plan before it is your turn to respond to a chain reaction collision is always the best route.
A+	PULSE	Patient Refusal	464-0608	30 minute video plus course materials	Most EMS litigation occurs not from what the EMS professional did, but rather, from what he or she did not do. With patient refusals, it is understood that the EMS professional is the expert in knowing whether a patient should be treated and transported, not a patient who may be in an altered state of consciousness and thus unable to make decisions. Refusals are high-risk situations medico-legally. Written documentation is the key to avoiding the minefield.
A+	American Heat	GIS: Providing the Foundation for Real-Time Intelligence, Part 1	463-0206	30 minute video plus course materials	Imagine having the floor plan of a large bank at the fingertips of law enforcement officers before responding to a robbery; or the most direct route for firefighters to a wildfire; or a graphical representation of the most likely terrorist targets within a given geographical radius. Sound like science fiction? Not anymore. Geographic information system (GIS) technology provides first responders with real-time intelligence data in the form of maps, floor plans, photographs, and much more. Join us as we explain the basics of how this new technology works.
